

Make sure you RSVP at the clubhouse – call, email, fax in your name, address, phone number, head count of adults and children along with ages of children. Bring your lawn chairs.




#### BRIDGE

## KEY VISTA GARDEN CLUB KICKOFF SATURDAY, JUNE 25, 10 AM AT THE MASTERS CLUBHOUSE

So you have this bush growing in the yard and it looks sad. You've even forgotten what it's called or what it does; attract butterflies, make flowers, grow money? That last item would be nice, but you know you sure have spent money trying to make the poor thing happy and nothing's working. Well, have I got a solution for you!

Key Vista resident, Ellen Maracotta (me) is starting a Garden Club. We'll do things like share and trade plants, diagnose problems, find solutions and explore the kinds of plants that will be happy in our yards. We hope to have guest speakers, visit neighbor's gardens, and learn about how to get things growing. You can bring in your most despised weed, find out what it is and how to deal with it. You'll discover what plants are real natives, and find out what plants and shrubs you might want to avoid such as poison ivy, Brazilian pepper or Mexican petunia and why. Perhaps we might get permission to start a small community garden and grow things we can all share. And how about discovering a few plants growing wild that you can actually eat! I'm positive we'll think of much more to add to the agenda.

We may even choose a yard in the community to be BEST LANDSCAPED HOME OF THE YEAR with the winner announced to the community and if ok with our board, a sign designating the property as the year's best.

Our first meeting will center on keeping orchids alive. If you're like many of us, your attempts at growing them have been none too successful. But if you know their secrets and what they like, they WILL grow for you. We'll show you how to repot them, where to keep them and how to water them. There are some extremely simple tricks that make growing them quite easy.

Before the orchid demonstration, we'll talk about the goals of the club, have questions and answers, and do some general housekeeping that new clubs require. We hope to have 5 or 6 club meetings a year, maybe more if the desire is there.

So join us on Saturday, June 25<sup>th</sup> at 10 AM in the Masters Clubhouse and see what's growing in Key Vista. Bring an orchid if you grow them or another type

#### MORE BY ELLEN MARACOTTA

Did you know that some of the plants at our parks are edible? Can you recognize plants that are poisonous? Ever wonder where gopher tortoises live and if they have pals? Join us for an hour of pleasant walking and discovering at Key Vista Park, Saturday morning at 8 AM.

As a certified Advanced Florida Master Naturalist and Land Stewart, I was trained by UF with the intention of spreading the word about all that I've learned. This took about 4 years of intense instruction and field work. I also was trained to provide interpretive talks or walks during which I examine and provide information about the flora, fauna, and ecology of the area, helping people to gain a greater understanding and appreciation of the nature around them. As an example, I might help participants identify the critters we see and some of the foliage. On the beach I would describe the function of the wrack (sea grass and weed).

Groups include 10 or fewer attendees and require registration for the event. Please contact Doreen at the clubhouse if you'd like to sign up and give her your email address and phone number. Walks will take place on Saturday mornings beginning at 8AM. **Dates to be announced** according to demand and I hope there will be lots of demands! See you soon.



# 7 THINGS YOU MAY NOT HAVE KNOWN ABOUT MEMORIAL DAY

#### 1. It was originally called Decoration Day

To honor the deceased, soldiers would decorate graves of their fallen comrades with flowers, flags and wreaths. Hence Decoration Day. Although Memorial Day became its official title in the 1880s, the holiday wouldn't legally become Memorial Day until 1967.

#### 2. It wasn't always celebrated the last Monday of May

After the Civil War, General John A. Logan, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, called for a holiday commemorating fallen soldiers to be observed every May 30. But due to the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which took effect in 1971, Memorial Day was moved to the last Monday of May to ensure long weekends. Some groups, like the veterans' organization American Legion, have been working to restore the original date to set the day apart and pay proper tribute to the servicemen and women who sacrificed their lives defending the nation.

#### 3. It's legally required to observe a National Moment of Remembrance

In December 2000, Congress passed a law requiring Americans to pause at 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day to remember and honor the fallen. But this doesn't appear to be common knowledge, or if it is, by 3 p.m. most people seem to be too deep into a hot dog-induced food coma to officially observe the moment.

#### 4. James A. Garfield delivered a rather lengthy speech at the first Memorial Day ceremony

Of course then it was still called Decoration Day, and at the time, Garfield was a Civil War General and Republican Congressman, not yet a President. On May 30, 1868, he addressed the several thousand people gathered at Arlington National Cemetery. "If silence is ever golden," Garfield said, "it must be beside the graves of 15,000 men, whose lives were more significant than speech, and whose death was a poem the music of which can never be sung."

#### 5. Several states observe Confederate Memorial Day

In addition to the national holiday, nine states officially set aside a day to honor those who died fighting for the Confederacy in the Civil War: Texas, South Carolina, North Carolina, Alabama, Virginia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee and Georgia. The days vary, but only Virginia observes Confederate Memorial Day on the last Monday of May, in accordance with the federal observance of Memorial Day.

#### 6. Waterloo, New York is considered the birthplace of Memorial Day

According to the town's website, in 1966 Congress unanimously passed a resolution to officially recognize Waterloo as the birthplace of the holiday. However, it remains a contentious debate, with other towns, like Boalsburg, Pa., claiming the title of "Birthplace of Memorial Day" as well.

#### 7. More than 36 million people will travel at least 50 miles from home this Memorial Day

At least, according to AAA estimates. That's the highest total since the recession.



## HADDY FATHER'S DAY

Father's Day officially began in 1910 in Spokane, Washington, where 27-year-old Sonora Dodd proposed it as a way to honor the man who raised her when her mom died in childbirth. Dodd was at a church service thinking about how grateful she was for her father when she had the idea for Father's Day, which would mirror Mother's Day but be celebrated in June -- her dad's birthday month.

The movement grew for years but didn't gain national-event status until 1924 under former President Calvin Coolidge. He said it would "establish more intimate relations between fathers and their children" and "impress upon fathers the full measure of their obligations," according to the <u>Library of Congress Wise Guide</u>.

The holiday gained traction during World War II, and in 1966 President Lyndon B. Johnson proclaimed the third Sunday of June to be Father's Day. President Richard Nixon made it a federal holiday six years later.

Father's Day has a passionate following, with about three-quarters of Americans telling the National Retail Federation they plan to celebrate on Sunday. Here are more facts about the holiday:

- <u>Census data</u> shows there are more than 70.1 million dads in the U.S. About a third of them are married with kids under 17.
- Two million fathers are single.
- Spending on Father's Day will reach over \$12.7 billion this year, with the average person spending about \$115.57 on presents. That's about \$2 more than the average spent in 2014.
- The amount spent on Father's Day is still less than what Americans spent on Mother's Day \$21 billion (well yah, we carried you for 9 months).
- About 20 percent of Father's Day cards are bought for husbands.
- More than 214,000 men are stay-at-home dads. Woo-Hoo!!
- Thailand's Father's Day is celebrated in December, on the birthday of King Bhumibol Adulyadej. Everyone wears
  yellow.
- On Father's Day in Germany, men drink all day at beer gardens. ROAD TRIP!!!
