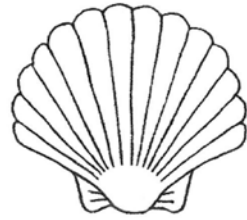

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FOOD FOR THOUGHT FROM MY KITCHEN TO YOURS

CHIPOTLE LIME MARINATED FISH FROM NEWPORT'S

½ tsp. chipotle chili powder
2 tbsp. soy sauce
1 chopped jalapeno pepper
¼ cup orange juice
¼ cup lime juice
1 clove garlic, chopped
1 tbsp. white wine vinegar
1 tbsp. dried oregano
½ tsp. ground cumin
2 tbsp. chopped cilantro
2 lbs. fish or chicken

Mix marinade ingredients well in Ziploc bag. Add fish and marinate no more than 2 hours or add chicken and marinate up to 4 hours. Grill. Serves 4.

Living with River Otters

General information

River otters are a water-loving member of the weasel family. They weigh 15-30 pounds, are usually dark brown, and have long and narrow bodies. River otters can be found throughout Florida, except for the Keys, and are most often seen in or near water. They are powerful swimmers and eat a wide variety of prey including crustaceans, amphibians, reptiles, fish, birds, insects and small mammals. River otters are a valuable furbearer resource worldwide and play an important role in Florida's ecosystems as a top predator in their habitats. River otters can occasionally create a nuisance by eating fish in hatcheries and stocked ponds, or by digging dens in pond banks.

Legal status

River otters are a native species that may be legally trapped and hunted in Florida. River otter hunting and trapping regulations and seasons can be found at MyFWC.com/hunting. A river otter can be taken as a nuisance if it causes or is about to cause property damage, presents a threat to public safety, or causes an annoyance in, under, or upon a building, per **Florida Rule 68A-9.010**.

Legal options to take a nuisance river otter

River otters are beneficial as an important part of river, lake and stream ecosystems. River otters generally prey on non-game fish, but it is best to prevent problems with river otters by providing fish with hiding places or excluding river otters from stocked ponds. Removing individual river otters does not prevent others from moving into or using the same areas in the future. However, if a river otter is a nuisance, it can be trapped or shot using legal and humane methods.

Nuisance river otters can be shot on private property during daylight hours with landowner permission. Check with your local police department or sheriff's office for firearm ordinances before discharging a firearm.



A LITTLE HISTORY LESSON

MEMORIAL DAY

- Even though numerous communities had been independently celebrating Memorial Day for years, the federal government declared Waterloo, N.Y. the official birthplace of Memorial Day. Waterloo first celebrated the holiday on May 5, 1866.
- Memorial Day was celebrated on May 30 for decades, but in 1971, Congress established Memorial Day as the last Monday in May and a federal holiday.
- Memorial Day originally honored military personnel who died in the Civil War (1861-1865).
- Roughly 620,000 Americans died in the Civil War — making it the deadliest war in American history. About 644,000 Americans have died in all other conflicts combined.
- President Bill Clinton signed the National Moment of Remembrance Act on Dec. 28, 2000, designating 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day as a National Moment of Remembrance.
- It wasn't always Memorial Day — it used to be known as Decoration Day.
- Red poppies are known as a symbol of remembrance, and it's a tradition to wear them to honor those who died in war.
- Even though Memorial Day began as a holiday honoring Union soldiers, some states still have Confederate observances. Mississippi celebrates Confederate Memorial Day on the last Monday of April, Alabama on the fourth Monday of April, and Georgia on April 26. North and South Carolina observe it on May 10, Louisiana on June 3 and Tennessee calls that date Confederate Decoration Day. Texas celebrates Confederate Heroes Day on Jan. 19 and Virginia calls the last Monday in May Confederate Memorial Day.
- The crowd that attended the first Memorial Day ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery was about the same size as those that attend today's observance: about 5,000 people.

Civil War: Approximately 620,000 Americans died. The Union lost almost 365,000 troops and the Confederacy about 260,000. More than half of these deaths were caused by disease.

World War I: 116,516 Americans died, more than half from disease.

World War II: 405,399 Americans died.

Korean War: 36,574 Americans died.

Vietnam Conflict: 58,220 Americans died. More than 47,000 Americans were killed in action and nearly 11,000 died of other causes.

Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm: 148 U.S. battle deaths and 145 non-battle deaths.

Operation Iraqi Freedom: 4,422 U.S. service members died.

Operation New Dawn: 66 U.S. service members died.



A LITTLE HISTORY LESSON

FLAG DAY

The American flag has played a big part in the lives of Americans. We have grown up admiring the flag and learning about the flag in school. We have seen it displayed on holidays such as Memorial Day and Independence Day. The flag is very important in American culture, but it's easy to forget all of the interesting facts of how the American flag came to be.

In honor of Flag Day, here is a list of 10 fun facts about the American flag and the history of Flag Day. After you read these fun facts, check out 10 myths about the American flag too!

- Congress adopted the Stars and Stripes as the American flag on June 14, 1777.
- For a while, the U.S. added stripes and stars to the flag when welcoming new states. At one point, the flag has 15 stripes and 15 stars. As the country continued to add new states, they decided to go back to the 13 stripes for the original 13 colonies.
- The colors of the flag have important meanings. Red symbolizes hardiness and valor, white symbolizes purity and innocence and blue represents vigilance, perseverance and justice.
- The first Flag Day observance was on June 14, 1885, when 19-year-old school teacher Bernard J. Cigrand placed a 38-inch star flag in a bottle on his desk. He assigned essays about the flag and its significance.
- In 1894, the governor of New York directed that the flag be displayed on all public buildings on June 14.
- On May 30, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a presidential proclamation establishing Flag Day as the anniversary of the Flag Resolution.
- On August 3, 1949, President Truman signed an Act of Congress that would designate June 14 of each year as National Flag Day.
- When the flag can no longer be repaired or used, it must be destroyed in a dignified matter, such as burning.
- If dirty or soiled, an American flag may be washed and dry cleaned.
- If a flag touches the ground, it does not have to be destroyed. Instead, just wash it if it's dirty.

It may have taken a while to officially declare June 14 as Flag Day, but now that it's a reserved holiday, take your American flag out and wash it if you must. Make sure you show your American pride on June 14!

Coastal Anclote Trail

Pasco County states that the extension from Anclote Boulevard to Stauber Memorial Highway is scheduled to begin construction this summer. The Elfer's Spur of the Pinellas Trail, which would be constructed by the City of Tarpon Springs to connect the Coastal Anclote Trail to the existing Pinellas Trail, there is an eagle's nest along the trail route that is a major obstacle. There have been efforts to find alternative routes and the City if attempting to secure an easement on private property to allow for construction of the trail. The City of Tarpon is obligated by the State of Florida to complete the project, but at this point they do not have a definite plan or timeline for the construction. This information was provided to me by a resident which he received from the Project Manager of Pasco County.

Pasco County's first #PascoProud campaign tackles illegal dumping.

"Illegal dumping negatively impacts our environment, looks terrible and costs taxpayers tens of thousands of dollars every year in clean-up costs," said Commissioner Mike Moore. "We intend to hold these criminals accountable for their actions. With all of us working together, as a community, we can all make a difference in our own backyard."

It's Wildfire Season

Pasco County has issued a Red Flag Alert which means that conditions are conducive for wildfires. It's the time of year when things are very dry and a carelessly discarded cigarette, an illegal waste fire, or a lightning strike can spark a rapidly moving and spreading wildfire.

What can you do? Don't throw cigarette butts on the ground. Carry a portable butt holder that fits in a pocket and can be emptied and refused. Don't burn debris. Right now, only prescribed burns (burns deliberately set to burn up ground debris that could cause a fire to spread rapidly) are allowed due to the extreme danger of wild fires. Clean out gutters and cut back greenery touching the home. Check roofs for loose tiles that could harbor an ember. Be alert when barbecuing. Remove yard debris.

Enjoy the wonderful weather responsibly.

RECYCLE PASCO!

Did you know that Pasco County burns our garbage in 3 huge furnaces? They even produce their own electricity created from the heat. We are lucky to have this in our county because, although burning the trash creates CO₂, landfills release methane which is even more detrimental to the atmosphere.

Sadly, only 20% of all recyclables actually make it to the Recycling Plant. This is too bad because the county may be forced to add another furnace to the existing 3, an expensive project paid for in our real estate taxes.

Many folks are not aware that recyclables may be mixed together in the same container. That's right. No more sorting paper, plastic, glass, cardboard, and metal cans. It's so easy. Recycling is picked up at the curb on the 2nd and 4th Wednesday of the month.

Then become a caretaker of our beautiful county, recycling as much as you can.
